It will create an inspiring environment to teach the life skills our graduates will need – critical thinking, collaboration, creativity and communication through various media – by providing agile spaces to cater for the needs of individual styles of learning. The teaching of our Scopus Values will be even more effective. When completed, the Gandel Campus will enjoy a welcoming entry to an easily navigated and naturally flowing layout for administrative and educational areas.

The fundraising campaign for this generational project will undoubtedly be the biggest in the history of the Melbourne Jewish community for any educational organisation so careful preparation and planning is critical to our success.

To this end I am delighted that **Esther Frenkiel** and Justin Liberman have committed themselves to the Foundation Executive. We thank them and look forward to their deepening involvement. In anticipation of the need for expanding our outreach, we have appointed Marlo Newton to the position of Fundraising Manager to support Marilyn Simon, Foundation Executive Director, and all our team.









Whilst our shorter term goals are developed, the Foundation's long term goals are also being advanced. A professionally managed endowment fund – our 'Future Fund' – with a significant corpus has been created. Our policy is to direct 10% of most donations to this fund and to add all Bequests. We envisage that our 'Future Fund' will ultimately be in the position to distribute sufficient funds to the College to reduce school fees across the board. I appreciate the care and work of Sam Alter, Stewart Baron and Ruth Picker, who, along with me form our investment committee.

This year also saw the launch of the College's Grandparents and Friends Club and we welcome the involvement of our wider Scopus family. Since 2006, 840 Year 10 students have enriched their lives, enhanced their Jewish identity and deepened their connection to Israel by participating in the world-renowned Scopus Israel Experience Program – 'Ulpan'.

Ulpan – a Transformative Experience

For almost 30% of these students, the experience was only made possible by the generosity of the Helen and Bori Liberman Family. As a result of this support, participation has grown from 20% of the year to a massive 95% and this Scopus experience is recognised as one of the most valuable and memorable for the majority of our students. This year 99 students are participating in either the 5 or 9 week program.

The benefits for the students. the College, the community and for Israel are enormous.

Matti Borowski, one of our key educators, says the experience is deeply personal. "For each student a different encounter, place or person will resonate. It gives each student the insight to make an informed choice about what Israel truly means to them. Participants feel incredibly lucky to have benefited from such a transformative trip and as such, they are keen to 'pay it forward'. They are contributing to local organisations, university student bodies and coming back into Scopus as madrichim and volunteers.

For Ronen Rosenblum and Sasha Fink, our current Kesher Captains responsible for connecting the student body with Israel, the experience was key to inspiring them to do more. Being fiercer advocates for Israel, attending the Friday night minyan more often or simply having stronger moral foundations are some. They both agree that having a near entire year level together is an experiment like no other. "While you do experience the ups and downs, your relationships with your fellow students are greatly enhanced. "

Ronen and Sasha conclude "Overall, Ulpan is one of the best Scopus programs as it really offers you a platform from which to grow."

Ari Kark, OC 2011, received the prestigious Gunther Baer Perpetual Memorial Ulpan Award in 2009 and is returning this year as a leader. He has been heavily involved in ZOOZ, the Scopus sponsored, student led, young alumni program which provides activities as a way of staying connected after school. He has also taught for UJEB while studying. Ari says "I think it's taken for granted that Jewish kids are Zionist or should be but it doesn't just happen. In this climate and with media bias it's easy not to be pro-Israel so we need to make a concerted effort to expose our kids to its beauty and wonder."

For another graduate of 2011, Delilah Schwartz, Ulpan was the inspiration for her return to Israel to live. She is now an officer in the IDF currently serving as the Chief of Staff to the General of the Joint Command, and was recently married.

Delilah says "Ulpan gave me a glimpse into the Israeli psyche and allowed me to build a circle of friends that ultimately supported me in my decision to make Aliyah. I believe the Ulpan program is one that encourages the students to find their own personal connection with our homeland - be that through Aliyah like myself, or through volunteer and community work - and build the foundations for their own Jewish-Zionist identity."

Ashlea Gild, our 2014 College Captain, is currently the head ('Rosh') of ZOOZ and involved in running the Friday night minyan and the planning of other events and Chaggim celebrations. She says

66 Going on Ulpan made me understand how important it was to continue a connection with Israel and cemented my Jewish identity. Ulpan is the starting point – being in the homeland, surrounded by our people, seeing all the streams of Judaism and being immersed in the culture. It builds on what we had learned. It affects us and then we bring that back. **99**

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
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
